For example, "stand up if the word needs an S ending and sit down if it needs an ES." Here are some ideas for movements that you could use while playing the "This or That" game: -Squat Down -Jump Up -Pat your Head -Clap -Spin Around identifying singular and plural nouns, I begin teaching how to add the different endings to nouns to make them plural. With my first graders, I start with just adding -S. Then we move on to -ES and -IES endings. If you need a rundown of the plural noun rules, check out this useful article! I also created the anchor chart shown below to help my students (and me!) remember the rules. Creating and displaying anchor charts are a great way to help your students as they complete worksheets on singular and plural nouns, I was only able to find worksheets that didn't spark my students' interest.
